PASTORAL LETTER

GATHERING IN THE EXPECTATION OF THE EUCHARIST When the Bishops of the world met in Rome from 1962 to 1965 at the Second Vatican Council they issued a document on the role of the laity in the life of the Church. By virtue of their membership of the Body of Christ through Baptism lay people are called to play their part in the Church's mission. In the liturgy they read Scripture and act as acolytes. In parish life they

- GREGORY HOMEMING OCD - act as pastoral workers in collaboration with the priest. Some ministries like the distribution of Communion, baptising and officiating at funerals are the normal function of the priest or deacon, but lay people may fulfil these functions as Extra-ordinary Ministers if there is a need.

Over recent years there has been a marked decline in the number of vocations to the priesthood. The effects of this decline are fast becoming evident. Parishes will have to be geared up to cope with fewer priests, and in some cases, without a priest. At present lay people are being inducted as Extra-ordinary Ministers of the Holy Communion and are distributing Communion at Mass, taking Communion to the sick, and offering prayers at the bedside of the dying. It is possible that the laity will also be called on to baptise and officiate at funerals. However, by virtue of the sacrament of Orders the celebration of the Eucharist at Mass, the administration of the Sacraments of Penance and the Anointing of the Sick are reserved solely to the priest.

Parish churches may not be able to offer the same choice of Mass times on Sunday and those from outlying centre with easy access to the parish church may be asked to travel.

It is also inevitable that there will be occasions when a priest will not be available for Sunday Mass. This could arise when the priest is away on authorised leave and is unable to get a supply. It could also happen when there is an emergency and the neighbouring parishes are unable to help. There will be places where it is only possible to have Mass once a month or at some other interval. On those Sundays a lay person will preside over a Liturgy of the Word at which Communion is distributed.

In these circumstances, God does not abandon his own. Rather Jesus is present when the assembly gathers in his name, when his word is proclaimed, when the reserved Eucharist is distributed among the faithful and when the various liturgical ministries bring about full, active, and conscious participation in worship. The same is also true when the laity lead prayers and administer the Eucharist (Viaticum) at the bedside of the dying: the risen Lord is there.

It is important that designated lay people be trained to assume these various ministries, drawing on programs provided by the diocese. Further, norms governing these liturgical services will be issued.

For the present it is important to understand that these changes are inevitable and to be prepared for them. It is also important that there be no blurring of the differences between the full celebration of the Eucharist in Mass and Liturgies of the Word at which Communion is distributed.

All are asked to pray for an increase in vocations to the priesthood so that Catholic communities of the future may share in the unique blessings that come with the full celebration of the Sunday Eucharist at Mass.

Reflection

Today's scriptures all address the question of who belongs to the People of God. Isaiah makes clear that anyone can belong: it is faithful service of the Lord, not ethnicity, class or caste, that gualifies. Paul also affirms that all are included -his mission to the pagans is not intended to exclude his fellow Jews from Christ's salvation but to help them see that it is offered to everyone. The persistence of the Canaanite woman in the Gospel further demonstrates that deep faith is not the prerogative of any particular ethnicity. We may be left wondering why Jesus failed to show her the compassion we see in so many other encounters, but the dialogue about children's food and house-dogs makes it very clear that this Canaanite woman—a foreigner—has a rightful place as a follower of this amazing rabbi, Jesus of Nazareth. May we always rejoice in the diverse community of faith to which we belong.

Living on the margins

Matthew's community consisted of Jews and non-Jews (Gentiles), which contributed to tension and disharmony. The Jewish Christians still saw themselves as Jews. For them, they hadn't changed their religion. Christianity was simply another reform-movement within Judaism. However, being Jewish was not solely about religion, it was also cultural; giving identity, meaning, understanding and depth to life.

The Jews saw themselves as a holy nation, a people set apart; and non-Jews were considered the opposite! So, when non -Jews began joining the new community and growing in number, the Jews felt overwhelmed and uncomfortable with the religious and cultural blending. Questions arose: Were non-Jews welcome in the Christian movement and on what conditions? Who decides about membership and participation? Is there openness to integration and compromise? Throughout his gospel, Matthew confronts attitudes of superiority and contempt for Gentiles among the Jewish Christians. For example: He introduces and gives prominence to the Gentile Magi. He has Jesus calling his followers to "love your enemies". He shows Jesus curing the servant of a Gentile centurion and exorcising Gentile demoniacs. In today's story, Matthew addresses the differences between a woman and Jesus' disciples. Matthew doesn't just identify her by geography but uses the term 'Canaanite'; an ancient word for Israel's' long-time enemies. He shows that it's the disciples who first have a problem with her: "She's shouting after us." Matthew uses the usual Jewish objection by having Jesus say: "I was sent only to the lost-sheep of the House of Israel." But then he adds a balancing statement by having Jesus respond to the woman and praise her faith: "Woman, you have great faith."

Matthew shows Jesus being deeply moved by the woman's desperate motherly love and her readiness to trust him. Jesus has no interest in her 'religion' or any questionable moral worthiness, and certainly not that she was a Gentile woman. Jesus is as close to those on the margins as he is to those who belong to the so-called 'inner circle'.

In the conversation between the woman and Jesus, Matthew demonstrates God's abundance: "Even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table." (Recall the feeding of the 5000 - twelve baskets-full of scraps were collected from what was left over). God's grace, mercy and compassion are lavish and reach out beyond Israel to embrace the whole world.

So, who might be today's equivalent of the ostracised Gentile woman or the Gentile and Jewish members of Matthew's community?

Like Matthew, perhaps we can use the story to examine contemporary life, with all its guestions, differences, uncertainties, tensions and complexities. A good starting point is to see life through the lens of God's unconditional love for everyone and to reach out with respect, compassion and sensitivity to others, especially those pushed to the edges.


